LESSONS

Scott Schuitema currently comes to the barn every other week to provide lessons. If you're interested in connecting with him, just give him a call directly. We've had a few



requests for outside instructors for speed, jumping, etc., but for a multitude of reasons, we have opted against doing this. The primary reason is that riding instructors need to carry liability insurance for their students, which is something that most people do not carry unless they work full-time as a trainer or have their own boarding facility. If you opt to ride during a lesson, please be mindful of the lesson and split the arena accordingly.

Winter Reminders

- The wind can really blow the snow across both Van Buren and 124th, so if the weather is bad, please don't risk the roads—your horses will be safely taken care of during storms.
- Lights: Please use them as you need them, but use the same logic that you would use at home—if you don't need them, or leave an area, turn them off. Keeping our electric bill low is a key factor in our boarding rate.
- Water buckets: During the winter we purposely keep the stall water buckets empty while the horses are outside. We fill the buckets right before we bring the horses inside for the night.
- Remember that if your horse leaves a mess in the arena, aisle, drive, etc. you are responsible for cleaning it up before you leave. This includes sweeping up after your horse. Please do not skip this clean up duty—it makes a huge difference in the overall appearance of the barn. **This also includes stalls for those times that you opt to leave your horse in the barn for showing, etc. during the summer when horses are not normally stalled nightly.
- Don't forget to dress warm and in layers!
